The Capital Jewish Museum and National Building Museum Announce: Sukkah City x DC Notable architects to highlight social justice issues through public display of creative Sukkahs

Washington, DC (date) — The Capital Jewish Museum and National Building Museum, in collaboration with the Edlavitch DC Jewish Community Center (EDCJCC), present *Sukkah City x DC*, a public display of creative sukkahs designed by notable architects, on view at the National Building Museum's West Lawn and the EDCJCC campus. Seven *sukkahs* will be on view September 18 through October 3, 2021, with each structure interpreting the theme of "welcoming the stranger," while exploring the traditions of Sukkot. Five of the *sukkahs* will be exhibited/installed at the National Building Museum, two at the EDCJCC.

Sukkot is a week-long Jewish holiday that celebrates the fall harvest while recalling the Israelites' 40-year journey through the desert. Each fall, Jewish families and communities build *sukkahs* - temporary structures in which it is customary to share meals, entertain, sleep, and rejoice.

"The Sukkot holiday will be especially meaningful this year, as we close a year focused on home, health, and equity," said **Kara Blond**, Executive Director of the Capital Jewish Museum. "We celebrate the importance of community by honoring the stories of place and transformation that a sukkah can inspire."

"The Sukkah City x DC presentation provides a modern spin on an ancient tradition and reflects the vibrant Jewish community in our nation's capital," says **Dava Schub**, CEO of the EDCJCC.

Featuring imaginative and expressive structures that highlight key social justice themes including housing insecurity, displacement, and our changing urban landscape, *Sukkah City x DC* asks visitors to confront the impermanence of our lives and to experience what it would mean to live without a solid roof overhead.

Aileen Fuchs, President and Executive Director of the National Building Museum notes, "The Museum is thrilled to showcase interpretations of this important religious tradition through this unique aspect of the built environment that appears in towns and cities across our country and around the world at this annual time of reflection."

Architect teams were provided with creative and technical requirements for the designs. Each structure must have three sides and a partial view through the roof, and be large enough to contain two standing people and a shared table. In addition, there must be an overhead screening made only of natural materials, and the construction must be built with enough stability to last the duration of the holiday.

Sukkah City first launched in New York City in 2010 and has subsequently been recreated in cities across the country. Sukkah City x DC, the first such presentation in the Nation's Capital, is a signature program for the Capital Jewish Museum, now under construction a block east of the National Building Museum and set to open to the public in Fall 2022. The project was directed by **Stephany Fry**, Museum Educator at Capital Jewish Museum, with **Caitlin Bristol**, Exhibitions Developer at National Building Museum, and

Dava Schub, CEO of EDCJCC. Rabbinical consultation and ritual blessings were provided by Rabbis **Aaron Potek** and **Nora Feinstein**, both of Sixth and I Historic Synagogue.
